

Minimum Bill Change in January 2019.

Beginning January 2019, the minimum bill charge for residential and commercial accounts will increase by \$2 per month. The minimum bill charge is located in the "Energy and Distribution" line item on your bill, along with your kWh usage. This minimum charge increase reflects the true cost it takes to get power to you, as it recovers much of the fixed costs of providing service.

The mimimum bill will rise from \$32 to \$34 for residential accounts and from \$42 to \$44 for prepay accounts. General service commercial accounts will see an increase in the base rate from \$34.50 to \$36.50. "The cost to deliver electric service is a cost that every member shares," said Ray Grinberg, CEO. "Raising the minimum bill allows us to cover those fixed costs of providing service without tying fixed cost charges to how many kWh you use."

2019 Washington Youth Tour Applications Now Available

Applications Due February 15

ri-County EMC is accepting applications from area high school students for consideration in the prestigious Washington Youth Tour, a unique, all-expenses-paid, leadership opportunity available each year to students in Georgia. The two students chosen will join more than 100 youth from Georgia to represent the state during the 2019 Washington Youth Tour to be held June 13-20. (77496001)

The fast-paced, high-energy program is designed to give students a taste of democracy in action, expose them to the nation's rich history through visits to national monuments and museums and encourage students to become active in their own communities.

The tour begins in Atlanta where students will get to know each other through team building and leadership exercises. In addition, students will learn about the history of electric cooperatives and what makes them relevant today.

The group then travels to Washington, D.C. to connect with more than 1,500 students from across the country. While there, they will cruise down the Potomac River; lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington Cemetery; and tour the U.S. Supreme Court, the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, Mount Vernon, the National Cathedral and Ford's Theater. Students will tour memorials honoring Presidents Franklin Roosevelt, Jefferson, Lincoln and Washington; World War II; the Vietnam and Korean Wars; and watch the U.S. Marine Drum and Bugle Corps and the Silent Drill Platoon perform at the Iwo Jima Memorial. Students will also visit the Smithsonian Institute and Holocaust Museums.


Early Cold Temperatures

Understanding the Impact of Cold Nights on Daily Usage

Cold days and nights of November and December brought an early winter to 2018. With 9 days in November at or below freezing and 6 days below 32° in the first two weeks of December, our members are feeling the chill through higher energy usage. In fact, residential kWh usage for November 2018 was 17% higher than the same month in 2017. December is on track for about the same increase in usage.

Cold temperatures really drive up energy usage, particularly for heat pumps when low temps drop below 30°. On average, the mercury dropping from 40° to 30° increases a home's power use by sixteen kWh per day, almost \$2 in energy. This increase can be greatly magnified for homes using resistance electric furnaces, electric space heaters or heat pumps with any mechanical problems that cause them to run on auxilliary heat strips more than normal.

Download the MyTCEMC app or sign up for daily usage alerts to get daily feedback about your energy usage. If you think you are experiencing extreme usage, schedule a free energy audit from Tri-County EMC.

Recipe Box

Shrimp Fra Diavolo

Ingredients:

- I lb. large shrimp, peeled, deveined
- I tsp salt
- I/2 tsp black pepper
- I tsp dried crushed red pepper
- I tsp cayenne pepper
- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- I small onion, diced

- I 6 oz. can of tomato paste
- I (14.5 oz.) can petite diced tomatoes
- I/4 tsp dried oregano leaves
- 3 tbsp chopped Italian parsley leaves
- · 3 tbsp chopped fresh basil
- · Angel hair (or other) pasta
- Parmesan cheese



Directions:

Heat the olive oil, garlic and onions in a large saute pan over medium heat until garlic and onions are translucent (about 5 min.). In a separate sauce pan, heat tomato paste and diced tomatoes, and simmer. Add fully-drained shrimp to saute pan, along with cayenne pepper, red pepper, parsley and basil. Increase heat, and stir well to mix ingredients and cook shrimp evenly. Boil angel hair pasta (penne or linguine may be substituted) using instructions on the box. Combine shrimp mixture and accumulated juices with tomato sauce, and blend thoroughly to coat shrimp. (88488001) Top plated pasta with shrimp and sauce, and top with parsley garnish and grated Parmesan.
